Here there is not Greek and Jew, circumcised and uncircumcised, barbarian, Scythian, slave, free; but Christ is all, and in all.

Put on then, as God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, compassionate hearts, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience, bearing with one another and, if one has a complaint against another, forgiving each other; as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive. And above all these put on love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony. And let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, to which indeed you were called in one body. And be

thankful. Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly, teaching and admonishing one another in all wisdom, singing psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, with thankfulness in your hearts to God. And whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him (Colossians 3:1-17 ESV).



A Word from Vicar Dub

The Sanctus, the Latin word for "Holy", is one of the oldest pieces of our liturgy. It is possible that it might even be the oldest piece of our liturgy. It is found in the Service of the Sacrament following the Preface where the pastor proclaims, "therefore with angels and archangels and with the all the company of heaven we laud and magnify Your glorious name, evermore praising You and saying:" "Holy, holy, holy Lord God of Sabaoth; heaven and earth are full of Thy glory". These holy words are from Isaiah 6:3 as the prophet gazes upon Lord God enthroned on His throne in heaven above. He records the seraphim, sixwinged angels, praising God three times with the word "holy". This threefold praise is indicative of the Holy Trinity!

The word "Sabaoth" is Hebrew for "heavenly hosts." Often times in the Old Testament, it is translated as "Lord of hosts" for God is not only the Lord of heaven, but also Lord over all the earth and all creation. Isaiah describes the seraphim as covering their face and feet with two sets of wings while they fly with their third set because they are in the presence of the Most High God.

The second half of our Sanctus is also from an Old Testament verse. The psalmist in Psalm 118:25-26 cries out "Hosanna, Lord! Blessed is He Who comes in the name of the Lord!" Who is who comes in the name of the Lord? It is Jesus Christ! When He enters into Jerusalem during Holy Week, the people cry out, "Hosanna to the Son of David! Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest!" Hosanna is a Hebrew word; it is a cry for salvation, "Lord, save us now!"

So what does it mean when we sing "Holy, holy, holy"? We are first proclaiming God's unique state of being holy. He alone is the Holy One. This holy acclamation joins us with the whole company of heaven in praising God and declaring that just as in heaven above, His

glory is also on earth. God's glory is synonymous with His presence: where His glory is, He is. In the New Testament, Christ is the very embodiment of God's glory. Christ is the Kingdom of God incarnate on earth among us. Therefore, since Jesus has promised to be with us forever, we lead into the celebration of the Lord's Supper singing the Sanctus. The very presence of our Lord and Savior is found on the altar in the church, and so we sing of His very presence here in the Sanctus.

Christ's presence among us is under the second half of the Sanctus as well. We are like blind Bartimaeus, proclaiming "hosanna" and crying out for salvation to our Lord. As we are told in 1 Corinthians, our very salvation and the forgiveness of our sins is from the Lord's Supper. For this reason, we place the Sanctus right after the Preface and before the Words of Institution. This last phrase, "Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord", contains a couple of meanings. First, it is a proclamation of the blessedness of Jesus Christ, who comes from the Father, the Lord of all creation. Secondly, it is a recognition that we have been made righteous before God because of the blood of Christ. We, as God's people, can now be called blessed because we are gathered in His name in His church to receive His gifts of Word and Sacrament.

"Whatever your hand finds to do, do it with all your might" (Eccl 9:10).

God bids us to be faithful in the tasks He calls us to do. He calls us to be members of a family (husbands and wives; fathers and mothers; sons and daughters). He calls us to be members of society (those who govern and those who are governed). And He calls us to be members of His family, the Church (those who preach and teach and those who hear and learn). Each of these callings from God places a duty on us.

As members of a family, husbands are given the duty to die for their wives as Christ gave His life for His bride, the Church; while wives are given the duty to respect their husbands and submit themselves to them as the Church does to Christ. Fathers and mothers are to raise their children in the fear and admonition of the Lord, teaching them the Ten Commandments, the Creed, the Lord's Prayer, and the Scriptures concerning Baptism, Confession, the Office of the Keys, and the Lord's Supper. Children are to honor their parents throughout their lives, and even when their parents are no longer alive, serving and obeying them, loving and cherishing them, and speaking well of them.

As members of society, God calls those who govern to bear the sword, that is, to punish those who do evil (those who live contrary to God's will) and to reward those who do good (those whose lives are lived in conformity with God's will). Those who are governed are to obey their leaders as to the Lord Himself, for their leaders bear the sword of God's temporal justice for a purpose.

As members of God's own family, the Church, He calls those who preach and teach

to do so in faithfulness to His holy Word. To preach and teach the Law of God to convict the hearts of hearers of their sin and to encourage, admonish, and exhort them to do good works in accordance with God's will. They are to preach and teach the Gospel, the full forgiveness of their sins accomplished by Christ and received through faith, not by works. They are to administer the means of grace in accordance with the Gospel and the Word of God. They do all this for the young and old alike, for those who are near and far off. Those who hear and learn are to submit themselves to their preachers and teachers. They are support them by their prayers and their gifts.

Each of these callings from God place a duty on us. They make a claim on our presence; on our prayers; and our time, talents, and treasures. So, "Whatever your hand finds to do, do it with all your might" (Eccl 9:10). Pray for your family, your government, and your church. Give of yourself by means of your time, your talents, and your treasures to your family, your government, and your Church. That is what it means to be faithful in the tasks that God has given us. That is what it means to do it with all your might.

Sunday Night Prayer Ministry for St. James School

Why?

The start of each new school year brings fresh opportunities for learning and growth. While this year will be no exception, this will also be a

school year like no other for St. James. We are excited to welcome many new students, and we recognize the challenges that the current pandemic has created for all students and teachers worldwide.

While all faithful believers have the opportunity to bring their needs and concerns before the Lord in prayer, our uniqueness as a Christian school allows us to do so more publicly and collaboratively than our public school counterparts. We are taught in Luther's explanation of the Lord's Prayer that "God is our true Father and we are His true children, so that with all boldness and confidence we may ask Him as dear children ask their dear father." What comforting words these are!

When?

Sunday nights at 9:00 p.m. for nine minutes (When there is no school on Monday, we will pray Monday night at 9:00 instead.)

Where?

At home, for those who prefer to pray on their own, **and** in the school entryway, for those who'd like to pray collectively

Who?

Any adults (including high school age alumni or friends) who desire to be in prayer for the needs and concerns of the St. James school community and will specifically commit to "Nine at 9:00"

How?

God knows and hears our prayers; you need not "sign up" unless you choose to. Through a closed Facebook group and also using the Remind app, prayer concerns will be added and weekly reminders will be sent. You may "opt in" to either or both of these, or simply pray on your own.

Nine minutes in prayer may seem very long to some, while to others it seems quite short. It takes roughly two minutes to name each student on our current roster by name. You can certainly fill the rest of the time any way you choose, but prayers for our teachers, administrators and other staff, PTL, and parents and family members of our students and staff might be a great place to start! The best words we can pray are the words Jesus gave to us in the Lord's Prayer, which cover all needs of body and soul.

Additional prayer requests may be added to the closed Facebook group, although no student-specific requests should ever be added without parental permission. Moderators will monitor the group closely to ensure that nothing is being shared that could tarnish a student or staff member's reputation or simply spread gossip. And, of course, requests made should only be used for prayerful purposes and kept otherwise confidential.

Many prayers for specific needs and concerns, including several petitions for children and families, are included in the front of our church's hymnal. If you'd like to check one out for home and family use, please talk to your child's teacher or to Nancy Butterfass or Pastor Loder.

This stands as an open invitation. Nothing about our prayer time should feel contrived or forced. Pray what is upon your heart, and as we lift our school's needs to the Lord, we can be assured that He hears and answers all prayers according to His good and gracious will.

"For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but one who in every respect has been tempted as we are, yet without sin. Let us then with confidence draw near to the throne of grace, that we may receive mercy and find grace to help in time of need." Hebrews 14:15-16

"And let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds, not giving up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but encouraging one another—and all the more as you see the Day approaching." Hebrews 10:24-25
