# Statement on the death of George Floyd and the ensuing riots

Discriminatory treatment of human beings on the basis of race is irrational evil and results in evil. It is folly, which can produce only anger and hatred. "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness." America's original sin of legal racism, the denial of human rights based on race, has reaped the whirlwind.

God's Word rejects racism. "All have sinned and fall short of the glory of God" (Romans 3:23). "No one is righteous, no, not one" (Romans 3:10). "Behold, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world" (John 1:29). All are equally created by God. All are equally accountable to God. The sins of all are equally atoned for by Christ. All are equally precious to God. Racial animosity is the result of sin and is sin in itself. Racism is not acceptable in the church. Jesus Himself bids us love our neighbors as ourselves (Mark 12:31) and did so precisely while rejecting racial preference (cf. Good Samaritan, Luke 10:25–37).

Unity in the church according to the Augsburg Confession is defined by Article VII: "For it is sufficient for the true unity of the Christian church that the Gospel be preached ... and that the sacraments be administered in accordance with the divine Word." Christ and His gifts bring unity and equity in the church. Racial discrimination in or by the church is sin. Racial conflict in our nation calls every Christian to introspection. "It is time for judgment to begin at the household of God" (1 Peter 4:17). "Righteous indignation" without self-reflection and repentance is meaningless, or worse, hypocrisy.

The one who grievously and unjustly took the sacred gift of life from George Floyd — resulting in a charge of 3rd-degree murder — will, ironically, be given the very thing he denied his victim, due process of the law. Justice must be meted out according to the law. Others may be charged.

We weep for George Floyd, for his family and loved ones because he was robbed of life. We weep for our nation. We weep for those across our nation who believe their only recourse is destruction. We weep for police officers everywhere, who carry out their honorable vocations with courage and goodwill but find their task infinitely more challenging and dangerous in the wake of the sad events in Minneapolis. We pray for the safety of all and the welfare of those who have lost property and livelihood. We pray for the police who must stand against mayhem. We support the First Amendment rights of the peaceful protestors.

We deplore injustice. We deplore destruction, robbery and doing physical harm to others. That, too, is injustice. We plead to citizens and governments of this nation for communities beset by poverty, crime and injustice. We plead for rational and unifying policies that will end

injustices and address social breakdown, lack of economic access, and other factors that fuel anger, hatred and dissension.

We shall pray, but we shall do even more. We shall follow the ancient mandate of the prophet of Yahweh: "He has told you, O man, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?" (Micah 6:8).

And we shall proclaim Christ, "in season and out of season" (2 Timothy 4:2). "For one will scarcely die for a righteous person — though perhaps for a good person one would dare even to die — but God shows his love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us" (Romans 5:7-8).

If then you have been raised with Christ, seek the things that are above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God. Set your minds on things that are above, not on things that are on earth. For you have died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God. When Christ who is your life appears, then you also will appear with him in glory.

Put to death therefore what is earthly in you: sexual immorality, impurity, passion, evil desire, and covetousness, which is idolatry. On account of these the wrath of God is coming. In these you too once walked, when you were living in them. But now you must put them all away: anger, wrath, malice, slander, and obscene talk from your mouth. Do not lie to one another, seeing that you have put off the old self with its practices and have put on the new self, which is being renewed in knowledge after the image of its creator. Here there is not Greek and Jew, circumcised and uncircumcised, barbarian, Scythian, slave, free; but Christ is all, and in all.

Put on then, as God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, compassionate hearts, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience, bearing with one another and, if one has a complaint against another, forgiving each other; as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive. And above all these put on love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony. And let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, to which indeed you were called in one body. And be

thankful. Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly, teaching and admonishing one another in all wisdom, singing psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, with thankfulness in your hearts to God. And whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him (Colossians 3:1-17 ESV).

This is the tactic that seems to be rampant in our social media narcissistic pride-filled world. Satan has used the distraction of side events, false information, and emotion-filled rage actions to divide us. And it's working. If we think back to the pain caused to many by the solitude we retreated into months ago when the pandemic swept the world, it happened. When we think back to the rage-filled images of destruction

that filled our world's city streets weeks ago, it happened. People accusing one another. People despising the decisions of one another. People attacking one another.

Dear children of God, I hope you can see the danger of what Satan has been able to lace our hearts and minds. Rather than being still, removing the noise, and taking a reasonable look at what is actually happening in the world, he's been able to distract and enrage us to be willing to look at one another as objects of blocking one another's rights to do any and everything as opposed to the true brothers and sisters we are.

When this will all end, who knows. So long as we are human and living in this world, we will struggle with Satan's incessant temptation of pride. You will daily be bombarded with the desire to put yourself first and your wants above all others. Though that be the truth, we must be quick to succumb that evil by way of falling to our knees in repentance. We must be the first to repent of pride. And we do so with the joy of knowing that though the world around us is a mess, the blood of Christ does nothing but bless.

"Good Teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?" asked the rich young ruler. Jesus said, "You know the commandments." And the ruler replied, "All these I have kept from my youth." And Jesus said to him, "One thing you still lack. Sell all that you have and distribute to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; and come, follow me." (Luke 18:18–22)

As we listen to this, one question is raised in our minds: Is Jesus speaking to us also or only to the rich young ruler? In other words, is Jesus telling us to sell all that we have and give it to the poor? As good Lutherans, we

answer: No! But why? Why should we not sell all that we have and distribute it to the poor?

The simplest explanation is this: If we sold everything we have, our wife and our children would be neglected. In other words, to sell everything we have and give it to the poor would ignore, even abandon, those whom God has placed in our care. Our money, everything we have, is not to be used solely for the church. But that doesn't mean it isn't to be used for the purpose God intends.

Everyone has three stations in life, three spheres in which we live and are to be of service to our neighbors. These stations are the church, the family, and society. We are members of all three of these by birth.

- We are born into the church by water and the Word of God, and our duties to others in the church arise from either our birth into the church or the birth of others by Baptism into it.
- We are born into a family, and our duties to others stem from either our birth into that family or the birth of others into our family.
- Finally, we are born into society, which is simply
  a further extension of our birth into our family.
  The duties we have toward other members of
  society come from either our birth or the birth of
  others into the same society.

All that we have and all that we are is to be pressed into service for the church, the family, and society. If we were to sell all we have and give only to one, the other two would be neglected, and our duties toward them would falter.

So consider your life and all that you have in light of these three stations. You pay taxes to support and help those in society. You provide food, clothing, and shelter for the members of your family. You save for college for your children.

But the one station that is usually thought of last is the church. Since the needs of the family and society are more immediate, the church is often given what is left over. This is not how it should be. Rather, we are to give of our first fruits – the best from off the top – even as Abel gave the best of his flock.

This requires forethought and intent. It means that you sit down and make a plan for what you will give from the beginning. It means sticking to it even when it seems there are other more immediate and pressing things.

This is all the more necessary now as we enter into periods of time while giving is low due to high unemployment or restrictions on meeting in church to give. If we love God, his gifts of forgiveness given through the means of grace we receive at church and only at church, then we will support the church just as we love our country and our family.

For all that we have and all that we are is given to us by our gracious and giving God. He spared no expense for us and our salvation. He gave up His Son into death so that our sins are forgiven, and we will live. What is more, He provides for all that we need for this body and life. And our lives in this world, among these three spheres of the church, the family, and society, are to mirror the generosity of the one who gave us life in all three by birth.

Don't let the church, your divine family, be ignored or even an afterthought. The church is nurturing you, bringing you up in salvation by Word and Sacrament for eternal life.

It's gone viral. We hear this on the news or from a friend, and we need to check it out. Usually it's a video or a picture. It means that this has been liked by a lot of people or has affected a lot of people. It can be humorous, heart-warming or stunning.

The world has gone viral. This time it's a real virus that hasn't only affected a lot of people; in one way or another it's affected everybody. We've become all too familiar with its name: coronavirus — 'corona' meaning crown. Its name comes from the virus's crown-like spikes. We're part of something historic that will change us for a long time to come, perhaps forever.

We may not have the virus, but we also have a crown. But it's a very good crown. St Peter says: When the chief shepherd appears, you will receive the crown of glory that will never fade away. (1 Peter 5:4)

St Paul wrote: **Now there is in store for me the** crown of righteousness, **which the Lord, the righteous Judge, will award to me on that day — and not only to me, but also to all who have longed for his appearing.** (2 Timothy 4:8)

And St James wrote: *Blessed is the one who* perseveres under trial because, having stood the test, that person will receive the crown of life that the Lord has promised to those who love him. (James 1:12)

What a contrast from the coronavirus to the crown of life! But the Christian faith is full of such contrasts: a crown of sin and death and disease to a crown of glory, defeat to victory, lockdown to freedom, death to life. *And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love him.* (Romans 8:28)

Jesus wore a crown. The soldiers twisted together a crown of thorns and put it on his head. (John 19:2) It's because of that crown that we are promised a crown, and can experience joy and confidence, even in the midst of a pandemic. It's through his crown of thorns and the 'throne' of his cross that he paid for our sin, and not only ours, but the sin that's infected the whole world. He rose to life, signifying his defeat of all that can destroy us. It's Jesus' love that saves the day!

During these days of struggle, may Jesus' love go viral. *Bless the Lord, my soul ... who redeems your life from the pit and crowns you with love and compassion.* (Psalm 103:1, 4) Cardinal Timothy Dolan of New York (formerly of Milwaukee, WI, USA) said: 'If you ask why God would allow this [pandemic] you also have to ask 'why' to the selfless acts of love shown in the midst of it.'
